This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical performances – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and all stakeholders what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Curriculum music

TIME

IN CLASS - Our timetables show at least 40 minutes per week for a music lesson within the classroom. All classes will also practice hymns for Celebration of the Word and Mass when needed.

WHOLE SCHOOL - The whole school get together to practise singing every Tuesday for 20 minutes Each Monday we sing in Whole School Celebration of the Word and when there are individual class celebration of the Word attended by classes and parents. Classes also have the opportunity to sing in class and whole school masses.

CHARANGA – Y1 – Y6 follow the units from CHARANGA, which delivers excellent music experiences in class lessons linked to the New Model Music Curriculum.

EYFS - This is taken from their curriculum for music.

Nursery

Enjoys listening to familiar songs and is interested in learning new songs and rhymes.

Developing an understanding of how to create and make sounds using different instruments.

Enjoys joining in with dancing, moving and singing.

Can sing a selection of nativity songs accompanied by actions

Explores how instruments and voice sounds can be loud and quiet

Explores music from other cultures and can talk about similarities and differences they've noticed

Experiments with movement in response music and stories

Can sing a selection of Easter/Spring songs accompanied by actions

Explores how instruments and voice sounds can be fast and slow

Can sing a selection of summer/end of year songs accompanied by actions

Reception-

Can listen to and enjoy a range of seasonal songs, then respond to with feelings, ideas and experiences.

Cauliflowers fluffy

Can sing a collection of songs and dance for the Christmas Nativity.

Can talk about music they like and dislike

Can respond positively to music from various cultures and talk how similarities/difference and if they like it.

Sing a range of Local North East traditional songs.

Chinese bell/drum music.

Can make music with a range of instruments or objects – taking notice of the pace and beat of the music.

Can sing and perform a collection of new song about spring time for a small audience of family members -hot cross buns

Can sing and perform a collection of songs about minibeasts.

Can use instruments that can imitate the sounds of minibeasts.

Can name instruments they use.

Can learn, sing and perform songs about looking after our world. Can use instruments they have made from recycled materials.

INSTRUMENTAL TEACHING

Year 1- Ocharina

Years 2-6 have the opportunity to improvise with glockenspiels, percussion instruments and keyboards following the Charanga scheme.

Co-curricular music

PERIPATETIC TEACHING – We have pupils in Year 2 learning to play the violin all year

ROCK STEADY- We have children from Years1-6 who every Wednesday learn to play in a band singing, playing the drums, guitar and keyboard.

KS2 CHOIR- Currently an after-school choir club is available in the Autumn term led by Music lead.

Musical Performances

IN SCHOOL

- Summer Singing Assembly- Years1-6 showcase one of the songs they have learnt from Charanga.
- Christmas and Easter Services in Church and school – opportunities for solo, group and whole school performances.
- From R- Year 6 children showcase their singing through Celebration of the Word
- Y6 Leavers' Performance
- Music listening within classrooms – to accompany drama, to support other curriculum areas such as history and PSHE. Music as background for art and writing. Music for dance in PE.
- Singing for worship time.
- Singing for fun in the classroom

OUT OF SCHOOL

- Church Services – Weekly mass on a Tuesday and Christmas and Easter celebrations in Our Lady's Church.
- Choir sing at Rotary Club and sing at a Carol service at Christmas.

IN THE FUTURE

- > Continue to Liaise with Local Music Hub – sign up for more of the musical opportunities available

- > Invite local musicians to visit and perform for us, explaining their journey.

- > Continue with CPD to keep up to date with the latest ideas.

- > Support for teachers and provide training to improve curriculum delivery and pupil experience.

- > Further liaise with and support our MAT schools – sharing ideas and offering support

- > MAT Concert

- > Invite parents and local community to share their musical skills – either as support in lessons or in a performance.

- > Further develop Music in computing.
